Who doesn't love a good kugel? These Eastern European baked puddings or casseroles, most often made of noodles or potatoes, are part of many Shabbat and holiday meals. Similar baked dishes exist in various Sephardic cuisines, but with different names and lots more vegetables. Learn about and taste some of these delicious, comforting dishes such as quajado (think crustless quiche with more veggies and less egg), anchusa (spinach, lots of onions and sometimes matzah), Persian greens casserole and more. Book Talk: Liberating the Holy Name: A Free-Thinker Grapples with the Meaning of Divinity

Oct. 21, 7-8:30 p.m. By Daniel Spiro

In an increasingly polarized world, atheists and religious fundamentalists still agree on one thing: that "God" can refer only to the supernatural Lord of Scripture. Author Daniel Spiro takes on this attempt to assert a monopoly over the meaning of divinity. He describes how his Jewish-atheist upbringing and later exposure to Orthodox Judaism set him on a lifelong search through modern Jewish philosophy, Christian theology and Islam and ultimately to a highly original personal theology. If we can liberate the Name itself from those who wish to monopolize it, Spiro argues, we will unleash a powerful force for social unity.

Daniel Spiro is an attorney and a member of Shirat Hanefesh Congregation (Kensington, MD). He cofounded and coordinates the Jewish-Islamic Dialogue Society of Washington (JIDS) and the Washington Spinoza Society. Copies of the book will be available for purchase.

Beyond the Civil Rights Anniversaries: Jews and African Americans Weigh A Movement's History and Legacy

Three sessions: Nov. 18, Dec. 2, 9, 7-8:30 p.m.

Nov. 18 - Before the 1960s: The Rosenwald Schools. Instructor: Aviva Kempner.

Long before the civil rights movement, Chicago philanthropist and Sears, Roebuck president Julius Rosenwald joined in a historic partnership with Booker T. Washington, the prominent African American intellectual, to fund more than 5,000 schools for black students in the rural South between 1917 and 1932.

Award-winning documentary filmmaker *Aviva Kempner* shows excerpts and discusses her film in progress about Rosenwald and his legacy and an early, nearly forgotten instance of joint black-Jewish civil rights activism.

Dec. 2 - When Freedom Summer Came to Hattiesburg. Instructor: Marc Fisher.

Many Jews joined the marches, bus rides and demonstrations that visited Southern cities like Hattiesburg, MS, to fight for civil rights half a century ago. For the Jews who lived in those Southern communities, though, things were more complicated.

Washington Post senior editor *Marc Fisher* traveled to Hattiesburg last summer and learned why many Jews back then were reluctant to join in. He'll discuss the article he wrote for Moment magazine about those difficult days.

Dec. 9 - The Future of the Alliance: What Do We Do With Our History?

Instructor: Aaron Jenkins.

The African American and Jewish communities, through the enduring relationship made famous in the 1960s, remain at the forefront of the social justice movement. How can we use this history ?

Aaron Jenkins is executive director of Operation Understanding DC, a highly regarded intensive program for Jewish and African American high school juniors and seniors. He will discuss how the next generation in both communities can continue the work inspired by these values.

Transformations in American Judaism: What's Happening in (and to) the Denominations?

Oct. 22, Nov. 12, 19, 7-8:15 p.m.

Half a century ago, it was easy to classify American Jews. They were Orthodox, Conservative, Reform, or Reconstructionist. Now it's looking like a free-for-all! We'll look at a few of the many groups that are growing, morphing, subdividing or evolving internally, from the relatively recent Jewish Renewal to the "open Orthodox" best known for ordaining female clergy, or Maharat.

Oct. 22 - Overview: The dramatic changes in American Judaism since the 1960s.

How the Conservative movement shrank, Reform reformed, and more. Instructor: *Rabbi Steven Glazer* is rabbi emeritus of Congregation Beth Emeth, Herndon, VA, and an adjunct professor at George Washington University, where he teaches the history of American Judaism.

Nov. 12 - Open Orthodoxy: A Renewed Focus.

In 1999, Rabbis Avi Weiss and Dov Linzer founded Yeshivat Chovevei Torah, seeking to train rabbis firmly rooted in Modern Orthodoxy but with the skills and passion to reach out to the entire spectrum of Jewry. Instructor: *Rabbi Nissan Antine* is rabbi at Beth Sholom, Potomac, MD, and a 2006 graduate of Yeshivat Chovevei Torah.

Nov. 19 - Jewish Renewal: Where Did It Come From and Where Is it Going?

The movement launched in the 1970s by Reb Zalman Schachter-Shalomi, who passed away this year, and other significant figures has infused many other strains of Judaism with its values, from meditation to egalitarian practice to "neo-Hasidic" fervor. A dialogue. Instructors: *Rabbi Mark Novak* is a "free-range" community rabbi and cantor and the founder of Minyan Oneg Shabbat. *Rabbi David Shneyer* is founder of Am Kolel and many other organizations and is past president of Ohalah, the association of American Renewal Rabbis.


Jewish Approaches to Mediation and Conflict Resolution

Oct. 22, 8:15-9:25 p.m. Instructor: Marc Gopin

This course will explore traditional Jewish values and practices as they emerge from the classical sources and examine how they correspond to, and challenge, contemporary processes of negotiation, mediation and conflict resolution.

Dr. Marc Gopin is James H. Laue Professor and Director of the Center for World Religions, Diplomacy and Conflict Resolution at George Mason University. He has worked extensively on conflict resolution in the Mideast and is a member of the U.S. State Department's religion and foreign policy working group.

Anti-Semitism, Anti-Judaism and Anti-Zionism: Confronting Hostility and Building Bridges

Nov. 5 - Presbyterians, Jews, Israel and Divestment.

In June, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) passed a resolution to divest from three companies doing business in Israel. What is the theological and political background of this move and its implications regarding Protestant-Jewish relations?

Rabbi Kenneth Cohen is rabbi of Beth Israel in Lexington Park, MD and founder of the Vine and Fig Project (vinefig.org), an interfaith clergy initiative. He attended the PC(USA) General Assembly in Detroit at which the divestment measure was adopted.

Nov. 12 - Anti-Jewish Feeling in Germany Today--An Examination.

Michael Brenner is Seymour and Lillian Abensohn Chair in Israel Studies and Director of the Center for Israel Studies at American University. He is also Chair of Jewish History and Culture at Ludwig Maximilian University in Munich.

Nov. 19 - Anti-Semitism in Europe: Why It's Serious and Why It's Getting Worse.

Emmanuele Ottolenghi is a senior fellow at the Center for Defense of Democracies. He headed the Transatlantic Institute in Brussels and taught Israel studies at St. Antony's College, Oxford.

This session presents an overview of Piyyut, liturgical poetry, and examines poems by paytanim (poets) Kallir, Yehuda haLevi, and others. We'll also look at how the discovery of the Cairo Genizah virtually revolutionized knowledge of this much neglected field. *Rabbi Steve Glazer* is rabbi emeritus of Beth Emeth in Herndon, Va., and teaches at George Washington University.

Dec. 10 - Mizrahi (Judeo-Arabic) Music of the Late 20th Century.

Don't miss the chance to learn from these stellar musicians! The class will hear recordings, discuss the influence of Arab music, and survey the performers, instruments and styles that create the unique sounds of this genre. *Haim Malka*, deputy director of the Middle East program at the Center for Strategic and International Studies, has wide-ranging expertise in Jewish and Arab music. *Naomi Malka*, Adas Israel's Ritual Coordinator, plays both Arabic and Western violin. She studied with Simon Shaheen, a master of Arabic music.

Do Jews Take Interest?

Dec. 3, 8:15-9:25pm Instructor: Thomas Timberg

The Bible and the Koran both explicitly prohibit taking interest on loans. And yet interest is a pervasive feature of modern economic life, and all the major religious traditions have developed widely used devices for dealing with interest and interest-like phenomena, from Islamic mortgages to the Jewish legal fiction known as "Heter Iska," which allows interest payments between Jews. We'll survey these devices and how they compare in Shariah and Halacha (Muslim and Jewish law). What underlying moral and economic concerns do the interest prohibitions reflect?

Dr. Thomas Timberg, an independent scholar and economist, has spent most of his adult life working in Asia and Africa. He is a member of Am Hatorah Congregation of Bethesda, MD.

This memorial program, sponsored by the Jewish Study Center in conjunction with her friends and family, is intended as an ongoing tribute to the values she held dear, including family, community, and caring for the sick.

Rabbi Avis Miller is rabbi emerita of Adas Israel and president of the Open Dor foundation. In 1987 she conducted a symposium on Bikur Cholim which became Give Me Your Hand, an influential resource on this mitzvah.
