
### Jan. 11 - Abuses in the Name of Biblical Archaeology


### Instructor: Gary Fellman



### Jan. 14 - Jewish Culture and Yiddish 'Renewal' In Sweden

#### Instructor: Miriam Isaacs

For Jews in Sweden, there's good news and bad. Good news: Yiddish is an official heritage language in Sweden and there is government funding for Yiddish radio, television and educational programs. Bad news: Kosher slaughter is forbidden, Sweden was the first country to support recognition of the Palestinian Authority and anti-Semitic activities have made many Jews uncomfortable.

*Professor Miriam Isaacs*, who has just concluded a Fulbright Scholarship teaching Yiddish in Sweden, will discuss her experiences.

### Jan. 21 - Jews of Cape Verde

Few people know that Cape Verde, a beautiful island nation off the coast of Senegal, was home for centuries to a Sephardic Jewish community whose founding members fled the Inquisition in Spain and Portugal, with a second wave coming from Morocco and Gibraltar in the 1800s. Come learn about this rich history and efforts to preserve it.

Instructor *Carol Castiel*, director of public affairs programming at the Voice of America, has played a central role in efforts to rediscover and publicize the history of this nearly forgotten Jewish community. She is founder of the Cape Verde Jewish Heritage Project and has traveled widely in Portuguese-speaking Africa.

## Jan. 28 - Jews in a Changing Cuba

There are fewer than 2,000 Jews in Cuba, down from about 50,000 in 1959. What is their situation as Cuba enters what is likely to be a period of dramatic change? Photographer Betty Adler was traveling in Cuba on a humanitarian mission to provide medical supplies when Alan Gross was released. She will share impressions and photographs from the Jewish communities of Havana, Cienfuegos, Santa Clara and Camaquey, as well as a rare bar mitzvah.

## Some of Their Best Friends: Righteous Gentiles of the Bible

Jewish tradition is filled with "righteous Gentiles," friendly or supportive non-Jews from Pharaoh's daughter to the sailors who were so reluctant to throw Jonah off the boat. In addition to biblical texts, we will discuss their treatment in rabbinic literature and stories. Do they come to be seen as converts, ambiguous figures, or villains? How do they help us define outsiders and their relationship to God? Can we learn anything from them about Jews' relationship to the outside world, then and now?

## **Using the Holocaust Against Jews?**

Are this and other recent events an example of a strange new wrinkle in anti-Israel and anti-Jewish rhetoric, in which the Holocaust itself becomes a weapon used against Jews? We'll examine this phenomenon.



Everyone's been to a Passover Seder. But did you know there is also a traditional Seder for Tu B'Shevat?

Tu B'Shevat is also known as the Birthday or New Year of the Trees. The holiday, which has also grown in its connections to caring for the environment, is traditionally observed by eating a new fruit and the seven species—wheat, barley, figs, dates (honey), pomegranates, grapes (vines) and olives. These are the foods that were found in abundance in the land of Israel when the Hebrews finally stopped wandering and settled down. Holding a Seder in conjunction with Tu B'Shevat developed in the 16th century and has enjoyed a revival in our modern world. This year is a biblical Sabbatical or Shmita year, heightening our appreciation for the environmental wisdom of our tradition. Join us for some learning and discussion related to the holiday and delicious tasting of fruits, the seven species and a special dish or two for the holiday.

*Rabbi Gilah Langner* is Principal of Kehila Chadasha's and Shoreshim's Hebrew Schools, an adjunct professor at Catholic University, and a meditation leader at the Jewish Mindfulness Center of Washington at Adas Israel. She led her first Tu B'Shevat Seder in Israel exactly 30 years ago.

## **Feminist Readings of the Talmud**

Instructor: Shalom Flank Three sessions - Tuesdays, Jan. 13, 20, 27 7-8:30 p.m.

What does it mean to read Talmud from a feminist perspective? Nothing less than bringing our whole selves to the study of the text. Plenty of feminist analysis has been done of biblical stories and of Jewish law, but what does a feminist perspective have to offer on a more unexpected topic: the rabbinic response when the rains fail to fall?

We'll spend all three sessions looking at a set of passages in tractate Taanit about asking for rain--a text that ties together Torah, sustenance, prayer, sex, power and our relationship with the Earth. Each week we'll engage in different styles of learning, while also asking what makes a reading of a text "feminist."

Translations will be provided, and experience studying Talmud is not necessary.
